1. The date for the Feathers Tavern Petition Movement should be 1771 rather than 1871 (p. 170).
2. The article on William Ichabod Nichols states that "Nichols was an early supporter of Channing and succeeded Channing as the second President of the American Unitarian Association (p. 101)." In fact, Nichols did not succeed Channing, because Channing was never President of the AUA. He was offered the position but turned it down because, in his mind, it was too sectarian a post. The first President of the AUA was Aaron Bancroft of Worcester.
